## **Local Services Update**

It has been a very busy couple of months! The wardens have been planting, weeding, deadheading and watering to create and maintain our lovely baskets and troughs. Balmy hot days along with stormy spells have been a blessing and a challenge to the planting this summer – there was amazing growth on our flowers and then Storm Floris gave them quite a thrashing – luckily most have recovered enough to last out the season!





As well as installing the monoliths in town, the wardens have been working on placing new frames for timetables in the bus stops and various asset maintenance work has been carried out. This has included repairing part of a picnic bench at Spittal playpark which had been vandalised, a swing seat replacement at Newfields playpark and benches in Spittal have been given a new coat of paint.



We had a number of residents request a more level path for disabled access at Newfields playpark so our wardens and Operations Manager hired some equipment and got the job done! The path is now completed and we hope it will enable more people to enjoy the park – what a view you have from there too!



As you will see in this issue, we have been busy with annual and special events in town and the wardens have been invaluable in the set up for these—we couldn't have done it without them! All this work has been completed alongside the regular playpark checks and splash park checks, maintenance and mowing so we look forward to a slightly calmer time over the Autumn, fingers crossed!



#### **Summer Flowers**

The Town Council has been delighted and genuinely surprised by the wonderful response to this year's floral displays across Berwick! Under the new guidance of our Chief Officer - whose experience includes over 30 RHS Gold Medals - we've taken a fresh approach this year, and it's clearly made an impact. From hanging baskets to vibrant planters, the town has bloomed beautifully thanks to thoughtful planning and a passion for horticulture. Many residents and visitors have commented on how stunning the displays are - and we want to keep that going. ## VJ Day 80th Anniversary

As you will know, this year is the 80th anniversary of the end of the Second World War. VE day was commemorated back in May and we marked the occasion of VJ day along with the rest of the country on 15th August. The day Began with the Proclamation and flag raising at the Castlegate war memorial after which the parade made its way to St Andrew's Wallace Green for a moving memorial service which included stories of local people whose lives were deeply changed by events overseas and on the home front.





Following the service, The Town Council hosted a tea party for various military associations, veterans and local groups on the Parade in the Food Festival tent, accompanied by the excellent Berwick Brass Quintet. There were moving speeches on the conflict from the Lord Lieutenant and a narrative on the 9th Battalion of the Royal Northumberland Fusiliers who were profoundly affected by the war in the Far East. In the afternoon St Andrew's Wallace Green hosted an exhibition, 'North Northumberland's Contribution to the Far East Campaign' which included the names of those men who died and survived that conflict. The Maltings Cinema screened the film 'The Railway Man', about the experiences of Eric Lomax, a former British army officer and POW who lived in Berwick.



The day ended with the lighting of the beacon on Windmill Bastion accompanied by a blessing and the bagpipes. It was a busy day and very many thanks to all who helped make the day a success - the Fusiliers Club, the Berwick Tri-Services Club, The British Legion, the KOSB, Cadets, Berwick Archives, St Andrews Church, Berwick Parish Church, the Maltings, Visit Berwick and The Berwick Brass Quintet - we are really grateful. Big thanks to Millie and Ray for agreeing to put their big marquee up a day early so we could host the tea there and congratulations on another fabulous Food and Drink Festival - one of the best weekends of the year!

#### How Your Council Works.....

At Berwick-upon-Tweed Town Council, we're committed to working in a way that is both effective and transparent. Local democracy thrives when residents are well-informed and confident that decisions are made openly and accountably. Recently, some concerns have been raised suggesting that the Council is holding "secret meetings" through its use of working groups instead of committees. We want to take this opportunity to set the record straight.

#### No Decisions Are Made in Private!

Let us be absolutely clear: all formal decisions are made in public meetings of the Full Council. These meetings are publicly advertised, open to all, and fully minuted. Any action the Council takes must be agreed at a Full Council meeting — and nowhere else.

#### Why We Use Working Groups?

Working groups are used by many town and parish councils to allow more in-depth discussion of specific topics or projects. They do not have the power to make decisions — instead, they explore issues, develop ideas, and make recommendations. This approach helps councillors debate freely and thoroughly without the time constraints or formality of a public meeting. It leads to more thoughtful and better-informed decision-making.

#### Transparency Is Built In

Although working groups don't make decisions, their work is not hidden. In fact, notes and recommendations from all working group meetings are included in the Full Council agenda, which is published in advance and made available to the public. This means you can see exactly what's been discussed and what is being recommended — and, crucially, you can watch or attend the meeting where those recommendations are debated and decided.

#### Open Government, Stronger Outcomes

The Town Council uses working groups to improve how we work for the people of Berwick, not to avoid scrutiny. We remain fully committed to openness and accountability in everything we do.
